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JAFAR PANAHI WON PALME D'OR AT CANNES FILM FESTIVAL

After winning the Golden Lion at Venice for The Circle (2000), and Golden Bear at Berlin




(along with the FIPRESCI Prize) for *Taxi* (2015), Jafar Panahi now has won the Palme d'Or for *It Was Just an Accident* (2025) at the 78th Cannes Film Festival (13–24 May 2025). He is the fourth director to win these top honours at all three major festivals, after Henri-Georges Clouzot, Michelangelo Antonioni and Robert Altman. Jury President Juliette Binoche said, 'The film springs from a feeling of resistance, survival, which is absolutely necessary today. It's very human and political at the same time, because he comes from a complicated country. When we watched the film, it stood out'. Indian filmmaker Payal

Kapadia was also a member of the grand jury. FIPRESCI jury composed of Laurent Delmas (France), Mariana Hristova (Bulgaria), CJ Johnson (Australia), Michael Ghennam (France), Eva Novrup Redvall (Denmark), Hosam Mostafa Fahmy (Egypt, Germany), Yannis Raouzaios (Greece), Olga Ruin (Sweden), and Freddie Wong (Hong Kong) awarded the films The Secret Agent by Kleber Mendonça Filho (Brazil, France, Germany, Netherlands, 2025, 158 min), Urchin by Harris Dickinson (Great Britain, 2025, 99 min), and Dandelion's Odyssey by Momoko Seto (France, Belgium, 2025, 76 min) in the Official Selection - Competition, Un Certain Regard (to a first or second feature film in the Official Selection), and Directors' Fortnight or Critics' Week (to a first feature film in the parallel sections) respectively. A Useful Ghost (Thailand, France, Singapore, Germany, 2025, 130 mins) won the Grand Prix in Critics' Week section. Honorary Palme d'Or was awarded to Robert De Niro during the festival's opening ceremony, while the other awards were conferred in the closing ceremony. The 4K version of Satyajit Ray's 1970 masterpiece Aranyer Din Ratri (Days and Nights in the Forest) restored under the initiative of the filmmaker Wes Anderson by Martin Scorsese's The Film Foundation through its World Cinema Project initiative at L'Immagine Ritrovata in collaboration with Shivendra Singh Dungarpur's Film Heritage Foundation, Janus Films, and the Criterion Collection was

showcased in Cannes Classic Section. The film was screened for the first time at Cannes, and in the presence of the lead casts Sharmila Tagore and Simi Garewal. Wes Anderson was also present on the occasion to present the film. The restoration of *Aranyer Din Ratri* was made possible with the support of the Golden Globe Foundation, using the original camera and sound negatives preserved by the Kolkata based producer of the film Purnima Dutta.





FIPRESCI-INDIA HONOURED PRADIP BISWAS WITH SATYAJIT RAY MEMORIAL AWARD 2025

To commemorate Satyajit Ray Birth Centenary (2 May 1921-2021), FIPRESCI-India installed an award titled: 'SATYAJIT RAY MEMORIAL AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO WRITING ON CINEMA' in 2021. The award is announced every year on Satyajit Ray's birthday conferring it on an author to acknowledge her/his outstanding contributions to writing on cinema in any Indian language including English, for propagation of film culture which was Ray's primary area of concern. Earlier recipients of this award are Aruna Vasudev (2021), I. Shanmughadas (2022), Ashok Rane (2023), and Maithili Rao (2024). FIPRESCI-India is honoured to declare the veteran author and film critic **Pradip Biswas** as the recipient of this coveted award for the year 2025.

Pradip Biswas was born in Kolkata in 1945. He did his Masters from the University of Calcutta in English, Linguistic, and Journalism in 1965-1967. Immediately after passing out from the University, he started writing in the Junior Statesman and the Cine Advance. Thereafter he started writing for English daily the Hindustan Standard, and Bengali daily the Ananda Bazar Patrika. He also contributed to English daily the Amrita Bazar Patrika since 1975, in English weekly the Screen since 1979, and in English daily The Telegraph since 1982 - where he continued writing on cinema till 1995. Since 1995 till date, he has been writing in English dailies the Indian Express and the Financial Express. He also contributed to the Sunday Mail since 1985, Cinema India International since 1995, Cinema in India since 1996, and Sense and Sensibility since 2004. He also wrote on cinema in the Bengali daily Basumati Patrika from 1986 to 1992. His first book on Indian Cinema was published in 1995 by the Directorate of Film Festivals under the I&B Ministry. Thereafter he has written 35 books in English including Buddhadeb Dasgupta: Cinema of Imprinted Times (1998), Yilmaz Guney: Cineaste Militant (1999), Sandip Ray: Take One (1999), Films of Nabyendu Chatterjee: \boldsymbol{A} Montage (2001), Eternity and Angelopoulos (2003), Mrinal Sen, Suchitra Sen and Aparna Sen: Sense and Sensibility (2004), Films of Nabyendu: Signature of Humanism (2006), Nabyendu's Manik Trilogy (2007), Revisiting Angelopoulos (2008), Cinema of Cristian Mungiu (2008), A Girish Kasaravalli Film: The Shadow of the Dog (2008), Ray on Ray (2008), Naomi Kawase: Woman Director in Progress (2009), Films of Samira Makhmalbaf (2009), Girish & Gulabi Talkies: Critique (2009), Five Indian Directors (2009), Anjan Road Documentaries (2009), Three Women Directors: Interviews (2011), Cinema of Zhang Yimou (2011), Cinema of Abbas Kiarostami (2012), Girish: Riding theDreams (2012), Gita Sen: Ethics of Resilience (2012), Andrey Zvyagintsev (2014), Sabiha Sumar: A Vigilant Outsider (2015), Orion: A Poetry Collection (2018), Deepti Naval: Dreams, Memories, Reflections (2019), Mrinal Sen: Iconoclast of Indian Cinema (2019), Sandip Ray: Take Two (2023), Foreign Directors: Critical Readings (2024), and others. He won the award for best book by the Korean Film Foundation in 2014 for his title Kim Ki-duk: Times of Scarred Memories (2014). He was honoured with the National Award in 1989 as the Best Film Critic.

The citation for the 'Satyajit Ray Memorial Award for Outstanding Contribution to Writing on Cinema 2025' will be handed over to **Pradip Biswas** in a program soon. From this year a cash component of Rs.10,000/- is added to this award as a token of respect which has already been given to him after announcement of the award on 2 May 2025.

NARAYAN ATHAWALE JOURNALISM AWARD 2025 TO ASHOK RANE

The 'Narayan Athawale Memorial Journalism Award,' instituted in the name of the fearless journalist Late Narayan Athawale, founder of Lokvishwas Pratishthan in Goa, was presented year to Ashok Rane. Internationally acclaimed artist Dr. Subodh Kerkar handed over the award to Rane where the senior journalist Vijay Kuwalekar was present as the president of the ceremony. The institution's president Anup Priolkar and secretary Savita Desai were also present on this occasion. This award is

Ashok Rane was honoured with this award in recognition of his invaluable work in not only film journalism but also in the field of film academics and for fostering a strong and vibrant film culture far and wide.
